## September 29, 2024 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### To my Family of Sacred Heart (St. Paul) and St. Joseph/BOL Parishes,

**ANGELS WE HAVE HEARD ON HIGH:** Although their liturgical feast is not celebrated on Sundays, today, September 29<sup>th</sup>, is the feast day of the archangels Michael, Gabriel and Raphael. Then, this coming Wednesday, the Church will observe the feast of the guardian angels. God's creation goes beyond what we can see or touch, and the angels – brilliant beings of pure spirit – are an integral part of God's creative action. The Bible speaks often of angels, our Lord's incarnation was announced to Mary by an archangel, and each of us is given a guardian angel to watch and to guide. We profess in the Creed each Sunday that we believe in that which is seen and that which is unseen. The unseen world: expansive, filled with angels, and no less real than the visible universe, is a place of wonder worth our prayerful contemplation.

**LIFE GIVING WOUNDS:** Erie native and theologian, Dr. Daniel Meola, along with his wife, Bethany, have founded a beautiful, national ministry called - <u>Life Giving Wounds</u> (<u>www.lifegivingwounds.org</u>). The ministry works to help young adults and adults with divorced and separated parents to give voice to their pain and to find transformative healing in Christ. <u>Life Giving Wounds</u> is a Catholic, peer-led movement that provides unique programs and means for Christ to transform life-draining wounds into *life-giving resources* of faith, hope, love, and joy for those bearing the pain of family dysfunction. I have been in conversation with Dan about bringing a chapter of <u>Life Giving Wounds</u> to Erie. If you are a young adult or an adult who has known the hurt of having separated or divorced parents, and if you are moved to learn more about this ministry, please contact me via email or Flocknote. I would love to talk with you and work toward making a local chapter come to life.

**WEDNESDAY WORSHIP:** When we began to offer Mass on Wednesday evenings, it was with some trepidation. We were not sure if it would "work." By God's grace, though, people are attending in good numbers. Recently, we had almost 40 people in church. That's wonderful! Our 7:00 am weekday Mass is perfect for the early risers and those on their way to work. Wednesday evening offers an opportunity for those who are not "early birds" to still attend Mass. Please remember that Mass is at 6:00 pm on Wednesdays (and finishes right around 6:25 pm). Confessions precede from 4:45 – 5:45 pm. I invite you to give Wednesday worship a try!

**ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI:** Finally, this Friday, October 4, is the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi. It is a little-known fact that "Francis" was your pastor's confirmation saint name, but it is a well-known fact that St. Francis is the patron saint of animals. Famously, he tamed a wolf that was terrorizing a town! Next Sunday, October 6, we invite you to bring your own animal(s) to Sacred Heart to be blessed after the 8:45 am Mass (please . . . no wolves). Admittedly, the logistics are a bit complicated, but we figured that between our two Sunday Masses was a good time to give this a try. Feel free to hitch your horses or oxen to any of the signposts in the parking lot. Your sheep and cattle are welcome to graze in the grass while Mass is being offered. If he didn't have to be with the Sisters of St. Joseph for Mass, I'm sure that Fr. Simmons would reptile-sit your lizards and iguanas. Anyway, I'll see you in the Sacred Heart courtyard at around 10:00 am to bless whatever furry or ferocious creature shows up.

#### Kinship Korner News Refugee Resettlement News

As stated in last week's bulletin, kinship's refugee resettlement efforts have been given a home in St. Andrew's annex at least for the next full year. We have been provided with generous space for both our refugee efforts and those of Bags of Hope. When the rooms have been rekeyed, we will set up the rooms with items purchased and donated since the gym's closure. Obviously, we will not have sufficient items to start assembling needed items for the 6-9 individual families coming in each month as we did before the gym's closure. However, at that time we will be able to restart collecting donated items needed to restock our inventory in our new home. We will let you know when donations may resume, where you can drop them off, and what are the critical needs. We will have drop off containers located within all 3 churches to assist with this effort. When we receive sufficient donations to assist Catholic Charities with at least a couple of families, we will let them know. When we had to pause our resettlement with the gym closure, you had in the past 2 years assisted 158 families of refugees from multiple counties relocate to Erie after living in refugee camps for an average of 10 years.

Items currently stored in the gym for Kinship including the furniture donated from the Avalon Hotel will continue to stay there until the asbestos abatement process begins.

#### **Bags of Hope**

The Bags of Hope ministry has continued to be active throughout the summer and into this fall season. Below is a picture of one of the bags that are being sewn by a wonderful sewing group and distributed to individuals. Thank you sewists!



Bags of Hope is still collecting the following <u>travel size only</u> personal care items for distribution to the men and women served by the Community of Caring's residential program: deodorant, shampoo, conditioner, Chapstick, bar soap, and Kleenex/tissue packets. These items can be dropped off in the marked Kinship donation boxes now located within all 3 parishes.

I believe that most of you are familiar with the tongue-in-cheek prayer to St. Anthony in hopes of finding a lost item, "Please St. Anthony come around there's something lost that can't be found." Well, the "Deacon Dabblings" were never lost; they were just put aside briefly while we were feeling our way through the change in leadership and the reorganization of our parishes. Now that we have a combined bulletin that includes all three parishes, "Deacon Dabblings", I am happy to say, will again become a weekly column in the bulletin and on behalf of Sacred Heart and St. Paul. I would like to extend a warm welcome to our partnered brothers and sisters of St. Joe's Bread of Life parish.


A college student was crossing the campus on his way to class when he came upon a crucifix lying on the sidewalk. The crucifix was desecrated. Someone had broken off the arms and legs and threw it on the ground. The student picked up the crucifix and took it to the campus chaplain and asked, "Should I burn the Corpus?" The priest replied, "No, don't do that. Put it up on your wall. Let it remind you that you must be the arms and legs of Christ. If anyone needs a glass of water, you must give it to him or her. Jesus will be reaching that person through your hands. If anyone needs a visit, you must go. Jesus will be using your legs." The student understood.

Scripture time and time again reminds us that we must be Christ to all whom we meet by treating them with dignity and reaching out to help when there is a need. The two greatest Commandments don't mince words when we ask, what is the greatest way to love God and to find our way to heaven? Jesus says, "Love God with your whole heart, mind, and soul, and love your neighbor as yourself." But if you think about it, these are not two commandments but rather only one. You cannot love God if you do not love your neighbor.

A few weeks ago, I witnessed a beautiful gesture by an individual who exemplified the meaning of being the arms and legs of Christ. My family and I were in Toronto, Canada, and we attended mass at a church nearby. Sitting behind us was what appeared to be a homeless person who had some degree of intellectual disability. Throughout the mass, this person talked to herself, and made raspy noises. As we were coming back to our pew after receiving Eucharist, an individual ahead of me dropped a 20-dollar bill on the floor, and asked the homeless person, "Did you drop this?" He picked it up and handed her the bill and kept going without giving her a chance to answer whether she dropped it. What I witnessed was not only an act of charity, but also a way to reach out to her and allowing her to keep her dignity.

My brothers and sisters, Jesus healed and forgave everyone who reached out to Him. He did so without chastising or punishing. He did it out of love. May we show that kind of love to all who need our help.
